

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

Evidence of effectiveness:

Prof Hardcastle Study Nottingham

- Faecal Occult Blood testing of an asymptomatic population
- 2% of number screened needed further investigation
- 11% of this number had cancer
- Improvement in mortality rate of 15%

Kronburg O et al (1996) Randomised study of screening for colorectal cancer with faecal occult blood test. Lancet 348, 1467-1471

Hardcastle JD et al(1997) Randomised controlled trial of faecal occult blood screening for colorectal cancer. Lancet 348, 1472-1477

UK Pilots (2000 onwards)

- Aim: to test feasibility of screening in "real life" NHS
 - Coventry and Warwickshire
 - Fife, Grampian and Tayside
 (each with approx. 1m pop.)






Diagram of an Abdominal aortic aneurysm

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN YOU GET SCREENED?

Breast screening involves having X-ray images taken of your breasts. These are called mammograms.

To help get an accurate X-ray, you'll be undressed from the waist up. But it will always be a female 'mammographer' that will take your X-rays for you, so there's nothing to be embarrassed about.

For some women, as the process of having X-rays involves a little squeeze of pressure, it can be a bit uncomfortable. But this part should only take a couple of seconds. In fact, the whole appointment takes a matter of minutes and could help to save your life.
